2014 Nature-Based Preschool National Conference Session Descriptions

Preschool in the Woods: Snow, No Potty, and Fire!

Sean Shaffer & Teresa Weed, North Park Village Nature Center

Discover the simple yet effective components of outdoor, unstructured nature play utilized at "Walking Stick Woods," a 12-acre parcel within North Park Village Nature Center (Chicago). Here, children are given simple tools such as rope and burlap. Assistance is provided only when requested, or when frustration threatens to thwart play.

Nature as a Catalyst for Emerging Curriculum

Marty Watson, Dodge Nature Center

This session will share examples of actual indoor and outdoor classroom activities that emerge from experiences in nature. It shows the delicate balance of teacher and child in the co-creation of curriculum. Examples and techniques will be illustrated that promote sustained project work leading to in-depth knowledge related to nature and the environment.

Demonstrating Children's Learning – How to create student portfolios that support assessment, reflect curriculum, and are fun and meaningful for children and families

Student Portfolios are not a new idea. In recent years at Schlitz Audubon Preschool, we have expanded our approach to nature journals, using them as assessment tools for teachers, as self-reflective journals for children, and as documents that reflect the growth and experiences of the child for parents to treasure long after preschool is over. In this session we will talk about the gradual evolution of our studio portfolios, as well as the variety of approaches different teachers have in creating portfolios with their students and how we share this information during the course of a school year.

Integrating High Quality Early Childhood Methods without Compromising the Nature-Based Approach Rachel Larimore & Steve Frisbee, Chippewa Nature Center

This session will focus on ways to integrate high quality early childhood approaches into a nature-based curriculum. Research-based curriculum, program and child assessment, behavior management

philosophies, techniques for teaching handwriting, etc., can all be used in a nature-based program. We'll discuss how that's possible using Chippewa Nature Center's Nature Preschool as an example.

Parent Communication and Involvement
